The Rural Women New Zealand National Board, Leadership Councillors and Area Committee Chairs met in Wellington for two days in February. There is no substitute for having time together and this meeting was lively, creative and collaborative. The venue was wonderful – Our Lady's Home of Compassion in Island Bay provides accommodation and meeting facilities so everyone stayed together and enjoyed the beautiful surroundings, excellent meals made on-site and the heritage and history of the Sisters of Compassion and founder of the Order, Mother Suzanne Aubert.

As we discovered during the guided tour of the Chapel and Heritage Centre, Sister Suzanne spent her early years in Aotearoa New Zealand reviving the Māori Mission at Jerusalem/ Hiruhārama. Suzanne, also known by Māori as Sister Meri Hōhepa, learnt to speak fluent Māori and became adept at using native plants to create medicines and remedies for a range of maladies. She also rode a horse to reach women and their families in need of her care. Sister Suzanne's work had many parallels with that undertaken by our own bush nurses.

There was a very busy agenda for both days. After preliminary introductions and welcomes, attendees set about the serious task of determining on Wellington's best cheese scone. A blind testing of five different scones was conducted and each participant rated each scone on its appearance, smell, taste and texture. The winner, by a clear majority, was the scone from New World Metro which beat out more expensive and touted scones for the honour.

It was then time to get on with the serious business. We started with a review of the last February meeting's action points. Liz then introduced the National Office staff who described their roles and the tasks and projects they were currently working on. This was followed by an update from around the Regions which included a brief summary of activities, highlights and challenges and plans for the year.

After lunch, Angela led a discussion on RWNZ policy development, the RWNZ policy portfolios, presenting to select committees and developing relationships and working with government representatives, political parties, Ministry

and Department officials. The second session of the afternoon focused on membership. Fiona led a discussion which emphasised that growing RWNZ's membership is the primary goal for the organisation this year. A brainstorming session on ways to increase membership followed and plenty of excellent and innovative ideas were shared. More information on this potpourri of inspiration will be available shortly. The last afternoon session was an update on the upcoming National and Regional elections.

After dinner, the team reconvened for workshop on RWNZ's competitions and Awards. We briefly reviewed the current competitions and Honours before thinking about how we want to celebrate success. Attendees were asked to submit ideas for new competitions and Awards. Lisa is now collating all that information and will report back to the Leadership Team shortly.

It was an early start on Day Two. The Leadership Councillors and Area Committee Chairs met separately to discuss their roles and experiences. The wonderful women who undertake both roles in their Regions oscillated between the two groups. Both groups came together for a feedback session before morning tea.

After morning tea, Jenny provided an overview of RWNZ's finances and the process for this year's Statements of Service reporting and audit. In particular, Jenny explained how important it is that we complete the necessary reporting as efficiently and accurately as possible in order to have audited accounts prepared for the Annual General Meeting and to meet RWNZ's legal obligations to the Charities Commission.

The last session was focused on the future. The key issues identified are building the number, diversity and capability of our Members; assessing the ways we can meet and creating opportunities to attract more Members; being proactive about how we measure and celebrate our successes.

Fiona had the task of summing up what had been a frenzy of ideas and information before we broke for lunch. This was a remarkable day and a half – the energy and commitment of the participants in addressing today's challenges was exciting and exhilarating. Work has already begun on the extensive task list from the meeting.

Handy Hints An extract from the Golden Jubilee Cook Book

Add a little sugar to cooked tomatoes to improve the flavour.

Jellies will set more quickly if you add a pinch of baking soda when preparing.

Run a grater under the tap before grating lemon or orange rind and the rind will not stick to the grater.

Troublesome flies can be got rid of if you place a few sprigs of mint around the kitchen.

Sausage skins are easily removed by immersing them in cold water.

To keep cheese fresh and tasty, place a small lump of sugar in the cheese dish.

Parsley can be kept fresh for several weeks by washing and placing in an airtight container and storing in a refrigerator.

A pinch of salt in the frying pan stops the fat from spitting when frying.

Keep stainless steel and chrome as bright as new by wiping over with a damp cloth which has a little kerosene added.

When brass has been cleaned, place some flour on a cloth and rub over. This keeps brass shiny and new-looking for longer.

Use a pair of scissors to cut off bacon rind - it makes the job much easier.

Try adding $\frac{1}{2}$ t of baking powder to stuffing for poultry, makes it lighter.


To make a thin custard set, add 1 teaspoon of golden syrup after cooking.
