\*\* Government advocacy update

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In early March, our President Gill Naylor and CE Gabrielle O'Brien met with the new Minister for Rural Communities, Hon. Mark Patterson.

The hour-long meeting was a great opportunity to brief the Minister on the work of Rural Women NZ at both a local and national level, share the priorities identified by our Policy Action Advisory Groups (as shared in the last Rural Wrap-Up) and discuss how to ensure rural and gender proofing is undertaken for new legislation and policies.

The Minister expressed his desire to meet with Rural Women representatives regularly to build a strong link to the rural communities we represent.

\*\* Meeting with Ministry of Transport on road safety

Our CE Gabe and RWNZ's Policy Advisor recently had their 6-monthly update with officials from the Ministry of Transport on road safety. They discussed 'where to from here' for the previous Government's Road to Zero Road Safety Strategy.

The update is that an 'Interim' Road Safety document is being prepared to replace Road to Zero which will be informed by the Government Policy Statement (GPS) on land transport and changes to New Zealand speed limits.

The GPS focusses on four key strategic priorities: economic growth and productivity, increased maintenance and resilience, safety, and value for money.

The intended aim is to balance investing in new projects and ensuring existing infrastructure is maintained and repaired.

RWNZ will be making a submission on the GPS and will share more details in the next Rural Wrap-Up. We will also keep a watch on the speed limit changes.

Presentation at Human Rights Commission for the NZ Universal Periodic Review

RWNZ President Gill was one of the speakers from a range of organisations who shared their views on the state of human rights in Aotearoa to inform New Zealand's fourth Universal Periodic Review in Geneva at the end of April. More than 30 diplomatic missions from all regions of the world were represented at the event. Their submissions will contribute to information that United Nations members will consider as part of the review. Gill spoke to RWNZ's key priorities for government and provided a copy of our Manifesto to each of the diplomats. You can download the RWNZ presentation by clicking here. \*\* Aged Care Commissioner releases report on amplifying the voices of older people

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The Aged Care Commissioner Carolyn Cooper has released her report – Amplifying the voices of older people in Aotearoa New Zealand.

The report was informed by a number of voices, including ours, with RWNZ hosting a webinar last year to give members an opportunity to have their say.

The report provides a snapshot into the issues and challenges faced by older people using health and disability services in New Zealand and focuses on the need for an integrated continuum of care that concentrates on prevention and support.

The report makes 20 recommendations, several of which have a rural focus: \* Supporting initiatives such as the 24-hour rural telehealth line recently established to ensure more equitable access to primary care services in rural areas

\* The need for Te Whatu Ora | Health New Zealand's review of aged-care funding

and services models to consider models of care and funding that support access and choice in home and community support services for rural communities.

March is international Endometriosis Awareness Month and a chance to grow understanding of endometriosis and highlight the impact it can have on those

Endometriosis is estimated to affect 120,000 New Zealanders, with symptoms including period pain that affects daily life; pain during and/or after sex; pelvic, lower back and leg pain; bladder and/or bowel troubles; abnormal menstrual bleeding; fertility issues; tiredness and low energy; immune system issues; premenstrual syndrome (PMS); and low mood and depression.

Calling all hunters - take part in NZ Game Animal Hunting Research Project

The New Zealand Game Animal Council (GAC) is undertaking a major research project about deer, pig, chamois and tahr hunting in NZ that requires the contributions of recreational hunters.

The research is designed to provide the GAC, hunting sector and rural stakeholders, as well as decision-makers with data on the number of hunters by species hunted and by demographic groups. It will also provide insights on how people hunt, why they hunt, overall harvest rates and hunter participation in conservation initiatives and is designed to identify where improvements need to be made for game animal management and hunting opportunities.
