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Activator Programme from strength to strength

Activator is a joint programme funded by the Ministry for Primary Industries and managed by Rural Women New Zealand. This is the third year the programme has been offered. Activator focusses on rural women at the outset of their business journey. It is open to entrepreneurs with a business idea they want to test out. Alternatively, they have a new business and are wondering what the next steps are, or they may be encountering challenges and obstacles in their business and need to focus on adapting to changed circumstances.

Activator has grown each year it has been run. The first session was held in 2019 with five rurally based entrepreneurial women travelling to Wellington to take part in the programme. In 2021, we offered two sessions – one in Christchurch and one in Wellington – during which we hosted 10 participants. This year, we decided we really wanted to take the show on the road, leave the main centres and reach further out into rural and regional Aotearoa New Zealand. So, in addition to growing the programme and offering 3 sessions, this year's sessions took place in Waikato, Wellington and Dunedin.

So, how does Activator work? Each entrepreneur is offered a 45 minute session with a panel of experts or mentors who help them look at their businesses, talk through possible next steps and offer advice and connections to networks that may be able to support them. We are extremely privileged to have Christchurch-based Marian Johnson, Chief Executive of the Ministry of Awesome, as our lead panelist again this year. Our other panelists are selected for their expertise and experience and come from across the country. The

panelists' mandate is to advise, empower and support the entrepreneurs; the experience for the entrepreneurs is a collaborative, option-generating friendly Dragon's Den.

Based on the success of the previous programmes and the decision to further expand it again this year, we had asked North Island Connector Kylie to design an awesome online advertising campaign. She came up with some fabulous ideas but we immediately had to put them aside. Within one week of the first Facebook post, all 15 available places in this year's programme had been snapped up.

As part of RWNZ's contribution to the programme, each of the Activator participants is given a membership to RWNZ. A highlight this year was the opportunity for the Activators to attend RWNZ events. In Region 6 the Greater Waikato Area Committee hosted an excellent evening with food and drinks. Claire Williamson led a fantastic panel of Waikatobased entrepreneurial women who shared some excellent business and life advice. In Dunedin, the Activators joined Members at the Region 1 Conference for an evening meal and to hear guest speaker, Irene Mosley.

In Wellington, the Activators enjoyed a lively panel discussion with entrepreneurs Kiri Elworthy, Kristy McGregor and Alex Matthews sharing their experience and insights.

By the time you receive this Express, our "O is for..." National Project will have officially ended. My sincere thanks to everyone for embracing this project and running events that raise awareness and much need funds for our three charities of choice enabling them to continue in their work to improve outcomes for women. You can continue to support this work if you choose to, however it will be on an individual group basis rather than as part of our RWNZ National Project which concluded at the end of June. There will be a full summary of events that took place and the funds donated in due course.

In the policy space, we have been working with Waka Kotahi (NZ Transport Authority) around school bus safety. Health issues are also at the forefront of our minds as more information on the Pae Ora (Healthy Futures) legislation becomes available, particularly in relation to the Women's Health Strategy and recently announced Rural Health Strategy.

The newly formed Centennial Committee has held its first meeting. You will be hearing more about this at the regional conferences. With our Centennial coming up in 2025, we are keen to hear about your ideas for Centennial celebrations and projects. Send them to Lisa at the National Office by Friday, 19 August so that the Centennial Committee can start planning in earnest at its next meeting.

In amongst all this, we have the end of our financial year reporting functions to complete, and a round of RWNZ National Elections to consider.

And last but by no means least, we are excited to announce that the National Office team has moved to a new office space at the beginning of July.

We look forward to making this an annual event and encourage anyone who didn't participate this time around to join us next year.

Connection is a big part of who we are as Rural Women New Zealand and we hope you enjoy getting some flavour of the various events that have been happening around the country that are highlighted in this Express. Whether it is the Triple F event in Te Anau or one of the regional conferences, there's been a lot of laughter, discussion and learning happening around the country.

We have also had RWNZ representation at some wider industry events. E Tipu – the Agri-summit was two days of future thinking and a look at some of the technology and approaches both in New Zealand and internationally that are likely to shape and inform solutions and responses for primary industry. The TUANZ Conference was a great opportunity to share some of the frustrations but also, solutions that we know will make a difference to those who experience poor or no connectivity on an ongoing basis. An RWNZ working group drawing on expertise and experience from within RWNZ membership and wider networks continues to work with both government officials and providers on fit for purpose options to improve connectivity.

It has been great to see the interest in our Activator workshops for women entrepreneurs with three workshops around the country quickly fully subscribed. This year with the help of enthusiastic members in the regions, we have been able to run these events in conjunction with regional RWNZ events to build connections with existing member networks. We also encourage you to spread the news far and wide about the NZI Rural Women NZ Business Awards. A chance to showcase the talents of wonderful women making a difference in our regions and rural communities, the Awards provide the opportunity to celebrate success and put the spotlight on those quiet achievers who just need that little bit of encouragement to put their name forward.

Earlier this month we farewelled Lucy Tayler, our Finance Manager who many of you will know as the friendly voice on the end of the phone for all of your financial queries. We also welcomed Alison Lyall who is working with us on a contract basis whilst we recruit for the permanent role. Our thanks to Lucy for her wonderful contribution and a welcome to Alison who has not only been coming up to speed on all things financial but has been a key player in organising our office move.

We are currently settling into our new home just a little further up the road in Wellington. We look forward to welcoming members and encourage you to visit when you are in town (though maybe wait a few weeks if you don't want to be commandeered to unpack boxes!).

On the policy front, we have made submissions on the proposed changes to the forestry settings within the NZ Emissions Trading Scheme settings, participated in the launch of the Women's Employment Action Plan (which includes input from rural women) and made both a written and oral submission on the Firearms Prohibition Orders Legislation Bill.

There has also been a strong focus on health in meetings with officials and Government Ministers particularly regarding the issues facing women and their families outside the main centres and the proposed changes with the health reforms. A media release on the key issues resulted in rural press coverage as well as an interview for President, Gill Naylor on Nine to Noon on Radio New Zealand.

The combined advocacy and representation efforts of many organisations with an interest in rural health resulted in a last-minute decision to include a rural strategy in the new legislation. Although this is only the first step, it means there is now a legislative focus on rural communities and their health.

You will also have received a recent request from us to provide information on any issues with school bus transport and safety. You will all be aware that this is an ongoing issue and we are collecting information to inform an update of policy by Waka Kotahi (NZ Transport Agency).

Finally, we hope you are all managing to stay warm and well, and like us, are looking forward to the days gradually getting longer and the first signs of spring!

Podcast update

The Black Heels and Tractor Wheels podcast is currently heading into its fourth season. We have interviewed over 30 incredible New Zealand women, from all around the country, who have graciously shared their journeys and experiences with our listeners.

A new addition to the podcast in Season Three was our sponsorship with Affco through NZME. This was a great opportunity to extend the reach of the podcast.

We have now received over 15,000 listens throughout our three seasons and have listeners from 42 countries around the world. You can listen to the podcast on our website, or on Spotify, Apple Podcasts and iHeartRadio.

CONTESTABLE FUND

Applications opened for the new Contestable Fund on 19 April.

The National Board has allocated a total of \$90,000 to be dispersed over a three-year period. The purpose of this Fund is to fulfil RWNZ's strategic intent of strengthening, supporting and connecting rural people and communities by encouraging and supporting initiatives and projects that will support and grow RWNZ's membership.

Grants are to be considered as sponsorship, rather than seed funding. The intended use of grants is to enable quality events run by RWNZ with quality presenters at a reasonable cost, and encourage subsidised registration fees for RWNZ members.

The total fund pool is split over 3 years with any surplus and unallocated funds carried over from one year to the next. This means that the unallocated funds from Year 1 can be carried over for projects in the current financial year.

Year 1: To financial EOY 2022 (30 June 2022) - \$20,000

Year 2: 1 July 2022 – 30 June 2023 Financial Year - \$35,000

Year 3: 1 July 2023 – 30 June 2024 Financial Year - \$35,000

An application may be made using the RWNZ Contestable Funding Application Form which can be found on our website or a copy can be obtained by calling National Office on 0800 256 467.

HERE'S HOW TO MAKE AN APPLICATION:

An application may be made for a new project or initiative to a maximum amount of \$5,000. Each project or initiative should be applied for on a separate application form. Applicants must be Members of Rural Women New Zealand. An application may be made by a Member; a Branch or Group; a Provincial; or a Region. Where an application is made by a Member; Branch or Group; or Provincial, the Leadership team of the relevant Region will be part of the discussions and consultation regarding the application.

In the case of an Individual Member (or a Group that does not hold an RWNZ bank account) applying for funding, that funding is to be managed through a registered RWNZ bank account, either Regionally or out of National Office.

Applications will be considered for new projects and initiatives that offer positive experiences for current and potential Members of RWNZ and builds the profile of RWNZ as a vibrant, relevant, progressive organisation.

First out of the gate!

The first grant from the Contestable Fund has been awarded. Region 6 Greater Waikato successfully applied for funds to support their inaugural RWNZ Waikato Women's Business Hub event. The organisers took advantage of the Activator Programme running in Hamilton during the day and held an evening panel discussion led by Board Member Claire Williamson which featured local businesswomen discussing their business journeys. There was also plenty of time for discussion and enjoying drinks and delicious food platters. This new Hub Group will bring together women who own and operate rural businesses, women in agri-business, previous Activators and Award Winners.

• Be the owner/s and operator/s of a enterprise based in rural New Zealand employing less than 30 full-time equivalent staff

• Take an active role in the day-to-day operation and management of your enterprise

• Your enterprise must have at least 50% ownership by women

• Previous winners of the Supreme Award at the Enterprising Rural Women Awards or the NZI Rural Women NZ Business Awards may not enter again.

• Have owned or operated your business/enterprise for at least two years as at the date of entry



In Memory Of Margaret Thompson



Branch Life Member of Lumsden – Region One

It is a privilege to write these words on behalf of the Members of Lumsden Branch.

Margaret joined the then Women's Division of Federated Farmers in the early 1980's. She had a way of getting people to help whatever the task was. She undertook door to door collections for the Blind Foundation (both her assigned route and any other Member who was unable to complete theirs) and the Street Day appeal for Alzheimer's Southland.

In 1986, Margaret took over as Catering Convenor for the Castlerock sale yards, a job that entailed getting all the bread, fillings etc. required for the cuppas and ringing and asking Members if they were helping on the day or making soup? This was not a five minute job but the President of the day had not a worry as she knew that it was in Margaret's capable hands. With her car's boot fill of goodies, off she went to the sale yards, being there by 8:45am ready for a 9am start. (Margaret's vegetable soup and scones were a treat. Margaret had a little secret to making her scones - it was to melt the butter and heat the milk, what a difference this made to getting soft 'spongy' scones. Thank you Margaret for sharing your secret.) This was not just a once or twice a year thing but more like seven or eight times. Margaret filled this role until 2012 when she retired. This was dedication at its highest.

Margaret was also the first to offer soup, time and energy for another RWNZ project – the Live-a-lone meals.

In 2005 the Lumsden Branch celebrated its 76th birthday with afternoon tea and honouring Margaret and Doreen Millar with Branch Life Memberships - honours well deserved for their service to Rural Women but also their time to their communities.

If every person in a community gave half as much as Margaret did to their community, what a wonderful community they would have. Margaret was an inspiration to many people and lived by the RWNZ motto of "Service Simply Given."

Lorna was a lady who always put others first. She always had a smile on her face and later in life added a bit of colour in her hair, pink, blue or purple. When asked about the colour she would say "why not?"

We have lost a most loyal member who will be long remembered by those she has left behind. It was a privilege to be asked to be part of her guard of honour at her Memorial service.
