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Leadership Hui Review

Gathering together in Wellington on an early Spring afternoon, regional representatives joined the Rural Women New Zealand Board and National Office staff for a mix of personal development, strategic thinking and practical problem-solving discussions.

The Hui began with a workshop on our different preferences and working styles. Participants had all completed a pre-Hui questionnaire and had some valuable time with an external facilitator guiding us through how an understanding of our own, and others', preferred styles could help us all in the ways we worked with each other. There was a few raised eyebrows and giggles as we all had "aha" moments both for ourselves and each other as we took our place on the continuums we formed.

This workshop set us up well for an afternoon of discussion about the proposals from the Membership Working Group who have been investigating options to help us achieve our membership growth goals. The group is made up of a mix of Board, Regional Leader and National Office representatives who shared their work to date for feedback and input from those present. An informal gathering followed in the evening with the opportunity for some socialising with both familiar and new faces. An early start the next morning saw the group focussed on discussion of a revamped approach to our Policy Hubs followed by sharing ideas for leadership development offerings.

Interspersed throughout the time we were together we also had an opportunity to celebrate what is going well in each Region, discuss niggles and gripes, come up with some practical solutions to help us improve communication and share our thoughts on the RWNZ "elevator pitch" (i.e. explaining what we do to someone who knows nothing about us on your way up the elevator).

At the beginning of the Hui, our President, Gill Naylor shared a very apt Whakatauki (proverb): Waiho i te toipoto, kaua i te toiroa – Let us keep together, not wider apart.

There was certainly a sense over the course of the two days of working together with energy and commitment. This may have been assisted by some rather delicious Roses chocolates!

The feedback from this workshop will now inform next steps in the three strategic projects mentioned and we look forward to updating Members further at the AGM in November.

The Leadership Hui, which was postponed in February because of Covid-19, finally took place in September. At the AGM, we will welcome Annette Marr as our new National Finance Chair and thank Jenny McDonald for her outstanding contribution during her tenure in that role.

Sincere congratulations were offered to Sandra Matthews, our North Island Board Member and National Chair, on winning the Rural Champion Award at the recent Beef and Lamb NZ Awards. It's a fantastic acknowledgement of Sandra's abilities, contribution to, and passion for, rural New Zealand. We are so very fortunate to have Sandra on our team.

National Office Update

The National Office team is now settled into our new space at 175 Victoria Street with connectivity woes resolved and unpacking completed (almost!). It has been lovely to welcome Members to the new space and we do encourage you to pop in if you are in Wellington to say hello.

This time of year is always particularly busy with the annual audit process, preparation for the AGM and the judging and preparation for the NZI Rural Women NZ Business Awards. When this is combined with a year of disruption, it makes for an extremely busy few months and we thank you for your patience and understanding particularly as we have worked to resolve the glitches with membership renewals.

Our thanks to the wonderful volunteers who completed their Statements of Financial Performance and their Statements of Service Performance for their respective groups. This is a very important part of the audit process and we appreciate the efforts made to assist us with reporting on our consolidated financial position required as part of our charitable status.

A highlight for us all in the office was the Leadership Hui in September. Given we had not been able to meet in person as a group since February 2020, this was a very valuable opportunity. Although we have all appreciated the wonder of Zoom meetings to connect us when we couldn't meet face to face, it was certainly great to be able to connect in person and build on that previous engagement. The laughter and energy in the room over the two days was wonderful to be part of with brains and funny bones all fully engaged!

On the policy front, the webinar on the Resource Management Act was well received and we will keep working to add to these types of opportunities for Members. We have also been involved in early engagement on how consultation might work for the development of the Women's Health Strategy and Rural Health Strategy as part of the health reforms. We are working to maximise opportunities for Members to engage with this very important consultation which is likely to happen in the first quarter of next year.

Gabe also attended Flourish – a one day women's health conference hosted by the Royal New Zealand College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists and which included participation from a range of medical professionals, NGOs and consumer groups and Government representatives. This is a valuable network for us to continue to engage with as this work continues.

By the time you receive this Express you will also have received one of our Policy e-newsletters highlighting other policy work including ongoing engagement on changes to the registration and licencing of firearms, consultation on electoral reforms and information on how you can participate in the Backbone Collective's research into police response to family violence.

There is no charge for the AGM but we do need to have your registration for logistics and catering purposes. NZI RURAL WOMEN BUSINESS AWARDS 2022

We have our Category Award Winners for this year's NZI Rural Women NZ Business Awards.

Once again, we received our largest ever number of entries from the most diverse array of enterprises and businesses yet.

Following last year's Awards review and feedback from the Award sponsors, previous entrants and the judging panel, this year's Awards entry criteria was refreshed and reframed to recognise the many ways that women own and operate enterprises in Aotearoa New Zealand.

As a result, this year's entrants included registered companies, partnerships, an iwi organisation and sole traders. They were spread across the country - the furthest north from Kaitaia and the furthest south from Invercargill.

This year's judging panel faced a huge task as the calibre of the entrants was incredibly high across all categories. There were no easy decisions and more than once, the judges commented on how humbling it was to meet such inspirational, innovative and entrepreneurial women.

The final round of judging took place in early October. Each finalist had an interview with the judging panel. By the time they reach the interview stage, our finalists have completed a raft of material and tasks for the judges' consideration including detailed written responses, preparing a video and obtaining references. Many of the finalists often tell the judges how incredibly helpful taking part in this process is for them. It provides an opportunity to review their business journeys, celebrate their achievements and assess their goals.

ACWW BOARD OF TRUSTEES NOMINEE: CLAIRE MAHON

Rural Women New Zealand has nominated our Member Claire Mahon for a position on the ACWW Board of Trustees. The elections for the Trustee roles will be held during the 30th Triennial World Conference in Kuala Lumpur in May 2023. Claire is nominated for the position of Chairman of the Communications and Marketing Committee.

Here is Claire's biography:

I am an international human rights lawyer and global expert on socioeconomic development. I work as a consultant on issues related to women and gender equality, the right to food and food security, agricultural production systems, the environment, access to education, global health, and housing.

I have worked as a Special Advisor to world leaders including the former President of Ireland Mrs Mary Robinson, and the first UN Special Rapporteur on the Right to Food. I've run a global consulting practice for over 20 years, offering advocacy, policy, legal and communications advice to businesses, governments, civil society, nongovernmental organisations, advocacy movements, and international experts. I've worked in the non-profit sector for organisations such as Amnesty International, and in academia as a law professor at some of the world's top academic institutions. I've also worked as the Senior Advisor on Human Rights and Inclusive Development for the New Zealand Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

I am passionate about women's empowerment, the role of women in agriculture and the environment, rural women's health and education, and communicating about these issues. I have written and edited books on the right to food, the right to health, women and the environment, and housing rights and homelessness. I have written speeches, designed and managed websites, written social media content, drafted grant proposals, and authored advocacy guides and legal correspondence. I have been Board member/Trustee of organisations in New Zealand, Australia and Switzerland.

After two decades living in Geneva, Switzerland, and working around the world, in 2018 I returned to one of my homelands, Aotearoa New Zealand, to the regional community of Rotorua, where my family have farmed (dry stock - sheep, deer, bull beef - and dairy) for four generations. I now divide my time between New Zealand and my other homeland, Australia.

Other positions of note:

- Experience in managing the communications, marketing, and media of numerous organisations, including the Global Human Rights Group, an international NGO, and I have worked in volunteer and paid roles in communications for member-led movements including Amnesty International.
- Senior Advisor to the NZ Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade
- Special Advisor to the first UN Special Rapporteur on the Right to Food Organised for the New Zealand Equal Opportunity Commissioner to meet with members of Dairy Women NZ and Rural Women NZ to learn about the issues affecting women working in rural communities and on farms. Co-author of the book "The Fight for the Right to Food", with Jean Ziegler
- Co-editor of the book "Realizing the Right to Health"
- Keynote speaker at the NZ Foreign Policy School in the year the theme was the Global Food Crises
- Editor for Oxford University Press.
- I work fluently in French, and passably in Spanish, and I have a basic knowledge of Te Reo Māori.

Black and Coloured Sheep Breeders' Association

Members of the Black and Coloured Sheep Breeders' Association of New Zealand all have one thing in common – they all love wool and naturally coloured sheep and live somewhere in New Zealand! The only differences are in the flock size (from zero to thousands), purpose and location (small lifestyle blocks to large commercial farms).

Some produce wool for use in their own handcrafts such as spinning, felting and weaving, or to sell to craftspeople. Others are involved in the commercial production of naturally coloured wool products, or breed for high quality sheepskins. Some do not own sheep, or are unable to be crafty, but they are interested in and wear or own something made from naturally coloured wool.

The Association offers a wide range of activities with members participating in events such as displays, field days and shows.

We also hold a National Fleece Competition where nonmembers can purchase top quality hand craft fleeces. Only members can enter in the fleece, handcraft, sheep skin and photography competitions so whether you're crafty, own sheep or just love natural fibre there's something for everyone. New members are also given the option to be partnered with a mentor who can offer help and advice on everything from animal health to showing their sheep or crafts if they would like. There will soon be instructional videos added to our members section of the website (under construction) and all members receive a quarterly magazine and a copy of the annual breeders' flock book.

We encourage all members to attend our annual conference and AGM which is hosted by a different branch each year. Here you can not only enter the crafty competitions, but purchase some of the entries and more importantly meet the Committee and play an active role in what you want the Association and Branches to do more (or less) of!

We have a range of membership options including one for Junior members. At our last conference our youngest Junior Member to attend was 3 years old decked out from head to toe in hand spun, hand knitted clothing his mom made from the wool off his own pet sheep!

National Project Update - COUNTRY OF STUDY

So as an impromptu, running with 'the meeting of people from different cultures', two members present, gave their experiences to settling into life in New Zealand. Jennie came from Rhodesia in 1979, settling in Ararata, and Alma came from England in 1952 settling in Taranaki. There was a mixed quiz of RWNZ and general questions and a hilarious skit from the Stratford Branch Members - running a WDFF meeting, written back in 1985 with one of those members still included.

Centennial Committee

The Committee met again via Zoom at the end of August. This had provided the opportunity for Committee members to discuss and collect ideas from their Regional Conferences and we opened the meeting with a round the Regions review and report back.

It was really heartening to hear the range of ideas offered by Members as to how we could mark our cenntenial year.

Building on our earlier discussions regarding the need to create a co-ordinated timetable for local, regional and national events and projects so they could be mapped out over the year, the Committee discussed a methodology by which we could use to assess all the suggested proposals and projects. We decided that the overarching goal is to showcase the organisation throughout our centenary year. To achieve this, each proposal will be considered as to how it reflects the Past/Present/Future of the organisation and whether it will have a Local/Regional/National impact.

Using this framework, we considered the proposals received so far. There were some proposals that received unanimous support including the publication of a centenary book, a formal function, a garden party and the commemorative rose project initiated by Region 4. We decided that a number of ideas required further research and investigation while some proposals should be put to the wider membership for feedback.

An action list was prepared based on our discussions. One of the key actions was the formation of a sub-committee to further refine the proposal for the centenary book. Its mandate is to consider the costs, content and timeline to produce a book that celebrates the many aspects of the WDFU, WDFF and RWNZ. This sub-committee has already met once and work is underway on the identified tasks.

The next meeting of the Centennial Committee will take place in early November. If you have a fabulous idea for a way to celebrate our centennial year, please don't hesitate to contact the Centennial Committee.

REGION 6GW - WAIPA KING COUNTRY PROVINCIAL 75th Celebration

When Covid lockdowns scuttle your plans to celebrate important milestones, as they did in for the Waipa King Country Provincial in 2021, you just rearrange those plans to accommodate.

Members were finally able to come together on Saturday 27 August 2022 – one year later than originally planned - for a wonderful celebration of 75 years of service to their rural communities.

In August 1946, the first meeting of Waipa Provincial Women's Division Federated Farmers (WDFF) was held to "further the work of the organisation." With 19 Branches it was one of the largest in the country.

Waipa was the first Provincial to employ a paid co-ordinator for the Homecare Scheme – a valuable service that provided assistance to rural women who were in need of help in their homes after serious illness, the birth of children, especially mums who had multiple births and large families to cope with, and mums who had to go out on the farm when their husbands had farm accidents. Even today there are women around who still talk about the wonderful assistance they received during these difficult times.

In 1998, North and Central King Country joined Waipa thus becoming Waipa King Country as it is known today.

Just over 50 women attended the celebration at Rosenvale. Some had driven some distance to be part of the day. Memories were shared, history revisited and friendships refreshed. Past and present Members enjoyed the various items of memorabilia, wonderful food, and entertainment by Te Awamutu's own 'Woolshed Warblers'.

Barbara Kuriger (MP Taranaki King Country) spoke about the importance of our rural land and congratulated everyone on the contributions made to rural communities. We were reminded of the fund-raising events over the years and Treasurer Raewyn Marwood detailed the distribution of over \$350,000 to individuals and organisations since the year 2000.

The celebration cake was cut by Mrs Justine Baxter (President 1978 – 1980) and the current President, Sue Hall.

Sue Hall reminded those present that over the last 75 years the Provincial has seen many strong, innovative women – some had been recognised with national awards but many more have quietly got on with service to their communities, not seeking accolades or recognition, but simply recognising the importance of taking care of our rural women and families as they journey through their time on the land. The 75th celebration was to honour them and thank them for 75 years of Service Simply Given.

Conference 2022

Held in Stratford on Friday 29th July 2022, the Regional Committee had created an interesting programme that took in firstly the Region 6 Taranaki AGM, followed by several speakers covering off different topics.

Our first speaker, Nelson Polutu from Stratford's Tutaki Youth Inc – who is working with vulnerable youth in our local communities – opened the eyes of many present in the room as to how many youth have not got the basics in life such as 'cooking toast, boiling an egg'. As a policeman, Nelson has seen and worked with many vulnerable communities who need guidance in their lives going forward. His passion shone through in his delivery of sharing some examples relating to social issues such as education, health and well being, fitness, mentoring, truancy, housing, employment to name some. Tutaki Youth Inc has a drop-in centre, and has an association with a local gym which is very supportive of programmes for these youth in need.

Our second speaker, Juliet Vickers spoke about the changes in education over her 28 years of teaching. Yesterday's education was the 3 Rs and "one fits all". Today we know that doesn't work across the board, so students are being taught the skills of the 4Cs. (Collaboration, Communication, to be Creative, and Critical thinking) along with the 3Rs so as to develop life long skills to take them into the work space of tomorrow.

Again as with our first speaker, there are many gaps in many childrens' lives due to lack of parenting support in their lives as preschool and young children – so teachers have a lot to deal with on a daily basis, over and above teaching the curriculum required of them.

Changing tack, we had Jenny McDonald, National Finance Chair and Angela McLeod, RWNZ Policy Manager with us too. Jenny talked us through the RWNZ Strategic Plan going forward. She talked about funding to grow the RWNZ organisation, of the Contestable Fund for supporting initiatives and projects with the ultimate goal to grow RWNZ membership, the educational podcasts "Black Heels and Tractor Wheels", and employing the skills of the 2 Connectors Kylie and Marianne for helping run events.

Angela stressed the importance of the RWNZ Members providing 'real' stories when she sends out survey questions to back up her when pushing a RWNZ policy such as firearms legislation, impact of school bus usage, Three Waters, midwives shortage, M. Bovis to name some issues.

A big thank you to both Jenny and Angela for giving us more insight to the workings of RWNZ at national level.

The day rounded off with a thank you to all in attendance, and some went home with some goodies from the raffles.

Nicky was the type of person who could cater for 100 people without blinking her eye. She was a great friend to Marg Anderson and all the ladies in St Arnaud.


