SPEECH COMPETITIONS 2020

Remembering Women's Suffrage **REGION 5**



This photo was taken at the Region Five AGM in July just after Sue Vowell (left) and Margaret Scrimgeour (right) had been presented with a copy of the Suffrage 125 celebration Research Project Paper.

This research was challenging due to incomplete records, but showed the strong determination of the local women in an area only served by harbour transport and mud tracks to get to the central enrolling and voting points, often with children in tow and cows to get home to milk.

In partnership with Western Bay of Plenty Museum in Katikati, Region Five initiated an investigation of how named women land holders enrolled initially as ratepayer voters on the local government roll. Later these local women including some Māori, again showed their strong commitment to get on the General Election roll after 1893.

background in archive work before full time young family commitments, and this was her stepping stone to then do overseas post graduate study in England assisted by a Region Five Norma Evans Charitable Grant.

She has since been able to build on this experience by returning to her career with Hauraki District Council. We are very proud of Sharon and of our Suffrage Year project which received significant local attention Including a Museum feature display around Suffrage Day and is now widely available for future reference.

A local former Board Member, NMH Jenny Turner and her 1993 Suffrage Year Commemoration Medal was also featured. A number of New Zealand's prominent women were honoured with these special awards that year for their services to women. Unfortunately twenty five years later many of those strong women leaders have gone but their influence remains in the change of social attitudes to the roles of women since the mid 1970s.

May we never forget those involved in the Suffrage movement and the barriers that they broke down.

Shepherdess

Shepherdess is a new quarterly magazine, which launched in March 2020. Rural Women New Zealand has been following *Shepherdess* since its inception, and is proud to partner with the magazine in connecting, empowering and inspiring women across rural New Zealand.

We sat down with publisher and editor, Kristy McGregor, to hear about how the concept came about, and how the first year is going.

Where did the idea for Shepherdess come from?

I moved to my partner's family dairy and beef farm in the Horowhenua in early 2014, from far western Queensland. New Zealand is a lot less geographically isolated compared with parts of outback Australia, however social isolation is still a real thing in rural communities here. The concept for *Shepherdess* has come from wanting to connect women living in rural and regional communities, and create a place for their stories to be shared. I wouldn't say I set out determined to create a magazine, it's just that's the form it has taken!

They say print is going out of fashion. Why did you decide to go for print?

There's nothing like holding a magazine in your hands and being able to flick through the pages. Even for those of us who are very much working in a digital world, there's still something special about taking the time to sit down and read a hard copy. We have chosen to create a quality product, from the design to the paper stock, which has been a significant investment, but one I think is well worth it and doesn't come close to comparing to digital.

How do you create the magazine from the farm?

As the publisher and editor, I'm co-ordinating a whole team of writers and photographers who are based all over the country, so it's well and truly a team effort. It's mainly work from a home office, with big whiteboards for planning our next editions, which happens about six months in advance. The magazines are printed in Auckland and arrive on a truck each quarter, and my partner unloads them by tractor at the cowshed. We have converted the sunroom at home to a packing room, and my nearly two-year-old attempts to



help in packing magazines. Our Rural Delivery postie is on standby for my texts when there is a stash of magazines to collect.

What sort of stories is Shepherdess telling?

Relatable stories, about real life happenings. I hope that the stories will resonate with women living rurally, or with their heart in rural New Zealand, whether through shared journeys, feelings or experiences. We've got our regular features – Woman of the Land, Homestead, Entrepreneur, Going Against the Grain – and a lot of stories that come in from our readers. Women writing about their town for My Town, a Rural Weddings section, In Her Own Words column, and Farm Life story in each edition. It's a rural lifestyle magazine, for women, but not skipping over some fairly gritty and raw stories too.

What's been the biggest learning so far from your venture into publishing?

What I'm continually amazed by is how you can create something very special when a whole lot of people come together with a shared purpose. It's very powerful. And I'm amazed at the depth of talent, resourcefulness and courage in rural communities across New Zealand.

NZ LANDCARE TRUST ANNUAL REPORT 2019-2020

NZ Landcare Trust is an independent charitable organisation established in 1996. It is the leading national, non-government organisation working with the land user community to encourage and support sustainable land and water management. The organisation has flourished thanks to its practical, community based approach. Head Office is based in Hamilton but the landcare message extends over a number of regions, thanks to a dedicated team of experienced Regional and Project Coordinators. NZLCT unifies diverse interest groups, such as production, environment and recreation. This is achieved by including representatives from these groups on our Board of Trustees: Federated Farmers of New Zealand, Federated Mountain Clubs, Federation of Maori Authorities, Fish and Game New Zealand, Ecologic Foundation, Royal Forest and Bird Society and Rural Women New Zealand.

This has been my first full year as Chair of the Trust, and I feel honoured to hold this role.

It has been a big year for the Trust with Ministry of Environment funding approved and an additional funding stream from the Ministry for Primary Industries to become involved in more catchment projects, especially priority catchment areas. The net result has effectively been that a doubling of funding has resulted in doubling the capacity in the Trust.

This year's combined Trustee and staff meeting took place in Whanganui where we looked at issues around the Whanganui River and other catchments.

NZLCT and RWNZ collaborated successfully in two separate programmes over the Covid-19 period. One was a series of webinars which discussed Farm Environment plans, the other was online workshops on Biosecurity, especially around Field Horsetail in the Upper South Island.

Strong relationships between the Trust and the Trustee organisations are imperative to the excellent work of the Trust and I encourage Members to support the Trust where possible.

BAY OF PLENTY RURAL SUPPORT TRUST ANNUAL REPORT - AUGUST 2020

This year had been busy, with "business as usual" for the BoP RST until the operating environment of the last 6 months caused by the Covid-19 pandemic and severe drought conditions have impacted our region.

During Covid-19 lockdown on a day to day basis, most farming operations remained relatively unchanged. However, it was noted that many rural women and families faced added stress with children at home and the closure of their normal social outlets.

Under Level 4 RST was deemed an essential service in an emergency or life threatening situation which fortunately did not occur. Also our 0800 number remained relatively quiet.

Covid-19 overshadowed and complicated the worsening drought situation with annual rain fall throughout the area being as low as 25% of the norm. By January Northland and Waikato were officially in drought with a medium scale event being declared in those areas. In March the Government classified the whole of the North Island and the top of the South in drought.

Covid-19, the lockdown and distancing protocols have made our normal face to face approach assisting farmers with drought issues difficult so weekly Skype meetings were established and a "BOP Rural Connect" newsletter went out during April and May.

The Primary Sector Coordination Group (PSCG) has proved to be an integral part of the strategy to connect and integrate the network of farming and grower organisations, service and businesses that can prepare, respond to and recover from adverse events. Excellent support has been received from Civil Defence Emergency Management (CDEM) and the group consists of Federated Farmers, MPI, CDEM, DairyNZ, Fonterra, NZKGI, Te Puke Fruitgrowers, Beef & Lamb, Forestry (Timberlands) Young Farmers, Rural Women NZ and Dairy Women's Network.

Tests have been done and I am anxiously awaiting the results of these at the moment. This is written from the heart and I am hopingyou will see fit to display it prominently in the next issue of the Express.

We acknowledge the courage it took for this Member to give voice to her story and we wish to express our sadness and offer our support for the challenging times she faces.

Activator (Apdate



In November last year, RWNZ partnered with the Ministry for Primary Industries to run an Activator session for rural women at the outset of their business journey. The Activator sessions were like a friendly *Dragon's Den*. Each participant introduced her business and spoke about her aspirations and challenges with a panel of mentors. One of the participants was Hilde Hoven from Great Barrier Island.

Great Barrier Island is one of a few Dark Sky Sanctuaries in the world. Away from city lights and as an off-the-grid island, light pollution on the island is minimal so its dark skies are amazing for stargazing. But stargazing is so much more fun when you know what you are looking at.

This gave Hilde and Deborah Kilgallon a great idea. They wanted to offer visitors to beautiful Great Barrier Island the opportunity to go on an entertaining, astronomical journey. They studied hard over the next few years to find the most interesting and entertaining astronomical objects, facts and stories to share. Good Heavens was born.

They believe this story is best absorbed in comfort so they provide their customers with comfy chairs, blankets and even a hot water bottle in winter. "We want our clients to be warm and comfortable as they look up at the sky," says Deb.

Small group sizes ensure a personalised experience. Hilde says that, "there is opportunity for questions and to have a giggle. People remember things best when they're having a laugh, so we keep things light-hearted. The myths and legends we share helped our ancestors make sense of this magical world throughout the ages."

"And we find stunning locations, often with sea and sky views" says Deb. "We need a wide view of the sky. And on Great Barrier Island, where 60% of the island is park and covered in trees, this is usually best achieved close to the sea."

Deborah grew up in by the sea in Kerikeri, riding horses and looking up at the stars before heading off for an extended OE. After an international corporate career, Deb and husband Andy, decided they wanted to live in a place they truly loved, to create an active, sustainable life for themselves and their imminent baby. So they went to live on the stunningly beautiful Great Barrier Island, in 2014.

Hilde, born in the Netherlands, has a background in hospitality management. She moved to New Zealand and Great Barrier Island in 1999 after meeting her husband Roger on the island. Growing up in the light-polluted Netherlands, becoming a starguide was a revelation.

Creating Good Heavens has been life changing for both of them. "It's heart-warming to see the enjoyment our clients experience



when they see planets and star clusters through our telescopes and binoculars for the first time."

"Our Dark Sky Experience for groups runs whenever the stars are out, usually at Medlands Beach. For about a week each month, when the moon is bright in the sky and the Milky Way recedes into the background, our Moon Walk replaces this Dark Sky Experience."

Clients can also choose a private Dark Sky Experience, which is perfect for honeymooners, proposers, family groups with small children, corporate groups or a touring group of RWNZ Members.

Good Heavens are mindful of their fragile island. They consciously use products that generate limited waste and laser pointers that are charged by the sun. During their experiences, they touch on the effects of light pollution. After each tour, only footprints are left behind.

As overseas adventures are off our collective agendas at present, New Zealanders looking for amazing places to visit should definitely consider a trip to Great Barrier Island and a night time adventure with Good Heavens.

28th July 1922 - 7th May 2020

Born on 28 July 1922, Catherine was only 14 in 1936 when she started attending the Waihou Branch of Women's Division Federated Farmers' meetings with her mother (a founding member of the Branch) before, in 1942, she became a financial member in her own right.

The first role she accepted was as local agent for "Country Women". The Branch had around 40 women at the time. At the April 1944 meeting it was reported that 45 copies of Country Women be ordered and the cost be covered by the Branch. It is also interesting to note that at that time subscriptions were two shillings and sixpence - the shillings were to go to Headquarters and the pence towards Branch funds.

Cath always attended meetings regularly. In 1959 she was nominated President, an office she held over three separate terms over the years. On one occasion she made a presentation to the Dominion President Mrs Muriel Eastwood on her imminent departure to an international conference in Scotland.

Over the years she had always enjoyed attending Provincial meetings and in her younger days embraced National Conferences with enthusiasm.

In 2013 Cath received one of RWNZ's most prestigious honours, a National Service Award to honour her 70 years of "service simply given." She went on to serve another seven

years right up until March 2020 when she attended her last Branch meeting before Covid-19 lockdown.

We will miss her words of encouragement and her memories of the early days. She was indeed a loyal WDFU, WDFF, RWNZ Member.
