

CSW62 NEW YORK

Each year, the United Nations (UN) holds the Commission of the Status of Women (CSW). This year will be the 62nd event and is being hosted in New York on Saturday, 10 – Friday, 23 March, and will be attended by over 5000 women from across the world.

'Challenges and Opportunities in Achieving Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Rural Women and Girls' is this year's theme. Rural Women New Zealand (RWNZ) has been recognised as a leading authoritative voice for rural women and their communities, and consequently we were recommended to attend by the Human Rights Commission (HRC).

In collaboration between the HRC and RWNZ, a side event has been applied for and approved. The New Zealand Government is sponsoring this event in conjunction with the Argentinian Government and Australian Government, and is being held inside the UN. The subject for the presentation is Case Studies for Economic Empowerment of Rural Women from New Zealand.

This panel includes Minster for Women - Hon Julie Anne Genter, Ministry for Women Chief Executive – Renee Graham, RWNZ National President Fiona Gower, Fonterra's General Manager NZ Industry Affairs - Joanne Finer, and representatives from Argentina and Australia. The panel is being moderated by Human Rights Commissioner - Dr Jackie Blue, and also attended by ACWW World President - Ruth Shanks. is one in various venues outside of the UN complex - organised through the NGO CSW Committee.

Fiona is attending CSW62 as a member of the Pacific Women's Watch (NZ) delegation, and our National Chair, Penny Mudford, is attending as the Civil Society Representative on the New Zealand Government Delegation. Both Fiona and Penny are attending the NGO Consultation Day, as well as other CSW62 side and parallel events over the 12 days that they are in New York.

Fiona and Penny are supporting the launch of the ACWW "Rural Women's Survey" which is to take place in New York on Thursday, 15 March.

This is an exciting opportunity for RWNZ, especially being part of an international forum which will be highlighting the issues rural women face. It will also showcase the ingenuity, enterprise and abilities of our rural women to succeed, how they have overcome challenges to run successful enterprise in rural and remote areas, and how they have become empowered to become leaders in rural New Zealand. They will be able to discuss other challenges facing those living rurally and look for answers which will enable more of our women and girls to reach their potential.



NATIONAL CONFERENCE 2017 SURVEY RESPONSE

We are very happy with the overall feedback from the survey regarding last year's National Conference. Although the quantity of feedback was not large, the quality provided gave insights to what people were pleased with and things they would like to see in future National Conferences.

We found that the majority of people are motivated to register for the National Conference to meet other RWNZ members. The Conference is a great place to network, meet like-minded women and form friendships. Others signified that they came as they were members of the Southland Community or wished to attend the AGM.

90% of those who completed the survey were very satisfied with the Ascot Park Hotel as the venue, and 76.67% were very satisfied with the catering and ERWA Awards dinner.

In response to the Opening Ceremony, people placed positive feedback on the guest speakers, particularly Professor Paul Spoonley. Respondents said that they were challenged and fascinated by his speech.

During the ERWA presentations and ceremony, people most enjoyed hearing different rural women's stories regarding their businesses and gaining insights into their success.

At the Celebration Dinner, people found that the top highlight was the band – 'The Contractors', followed by the Guest Speaker Shona Richardson, and the buffet dinner.

Many felt as though the AGM was rushed, and that it should be moved to a day earlier in the conference. The presence of sponsors promotional stands and the NZI coffee cart was widely appreciated.

Respondents made many positive comments about what they enjoyed most about the National Conference 2017, including the chance to network, guest speakers, learning from other women and catching up with old friends.

Our project for this year is to raise money for the Adverse Events Relief Fund.

This summer has brought adverse events in the form of severe weather, which seems to be happening more frequently. The Adverse Events Relief Fund supports rural people, groups and communities, following an adverse event or natural disaster that disrupts their lives, leaving them in need of financial assistance.

Members can raise money for the Adverse Events Relief Fund through the sale of Aftersocks[™]. You can order Aftersocks[™] through the website at www.aftersocks.nz.

We look forward to seeing and sharing the diverse ways members can raise awareness and funds for the Adverse Events Relief Fund. A partnership between Rural Women New Zealand and NZ Young Farmers is helping to get young people talking about mental health.

RWNZ has funded NZ Young Farmers to facilitate 13 'GoodYarn' workshops across the country in November last year.

The workshops help equip people with the tools to recognise the signs of stress and mental illness and seek appropriate support. Taranaki/Manawatu territory manager Megan Bates was one of the NZ Young Farmers members trained to run the workshops.

"The workshops were extremely timely given the challenges created by this season's erratic weather conditions," she said. "Recordbreaking spring rainfall ended almost overnight and within weeks, parts of New Zealand were in drought."

"It is important people have the skills to recognise family members, farm staff or customers who may be struggling," she said.

The workshops are one of several initiatives NZ Young Farmers is using to help tackle the country's rural mental health crisis. Suicide rates are higher in rural areas at 16 per 100,000 people, compared with 11.2 for every 100,000 people living in cities, according to Statistics New Zealand. It was reported that six young men living in rural areas in Canterbury and the Waikato took their own lives late last year.

"As an organisation, we want to help make the community more aware of the risks," said NZ Young Farmers chief executive Terry Copeland. "The workshops are one way we can empower young people to identify those at risk and get them help."

Mr Copeland said NZ Young Farmers was extremely grateful to RNWZ for the funding.

"The support we received from Rural Women New Zealand to run the GoodYarn workshops was invaluable," he said. "This partnership has enabled us to expand our reach. Anything we can do to reduce the number of suicides in rural New Zealand is of benefit to the entire country."

Rural Women New Zealand Submission on the Property (Relationships} Act 1976

About Rural Women New Zealand

- Rural Women New Zealand (RWNZ) is a not-for-profit, memberbased organisation that reaches into all rural communities and has an authoritative voice on rural environment, health, education and social issues. RWNZ strives to ensure that all rural residents, workers and families have equitable access to services, inequalities are addressed by Government, and the wellbeing of rural communities is considered from the beginning of all policy and legislative development
- RWNZ is affiliated to the Associated Country Women of the World and as such upholds all United Nations, ILO and WHO conventions and outcome statements as they relate to women and rural women in particular

Introduction

3. RWNZ welcomes the opportunity to provide a submission to the Law Commission's Review of the Property (Relationships) Act.

Specific Comments

- 4. Many farms, agricultural contractors and agribusinesses are owned as Partnerships, Family Trusts, or Companies and when a relationship ends, the complexities of these add to the grief and confusion often associated with relationship dissolution
- 5. Many women work on the farm in an unpaid capacity due to the nature of seasonal peaks at work, because they tend to be the primary caregiver and because opportunities for work off farm are limited by distance and/or infrastructure
- 6. Rural women are disadvantaged in a relationship separation where those acting for them show a lack of understanding in the value of this unpaid work and the contribution it makes to the running of the farm business, whether the business is successful or not in an income sense. Women who need their partners or spouses can be left with no income at all
- 7. Where the separation is due to violence either physical, or psychological – women can be further discriminated by a controlling estranged partner through the unequal sharing of relationship property, lack of adherence to court decisions and/or orders, and lack of understanding of the value of unpaid work, especially with inexperienced lawyers, lawyers with no financial knowledge and those who practice unprofessional behaviour.

Solutions

- 8. Resolution of relationship property matters should include financial expertise which understands farm accounting and the value of inkind or unpaid work
- There needs to be education of lawyers involved in such resolutions to understand the nature of controlling relationships and that the circumstance is likely to be far more complex in a farming situation
- 10. Courts need to have the ability, and use it, to follow up on orders made to ensure that they are honoured by both parties in a resolution.

We ask that:

- 11. A separate clause be included in the legislation which ensures rural expertise, both financial and legal, is included in any resolution of relationship property matters when the property is rural
- 12. Any changes to legislation be subject to both gender impact analysis and rural impact analysis before being presented to the House of Representatives
- 13. All United Nations conventions1 and outcome statements2 from United Nations Commissions and agencies3 that relate to the empowerment of rural women be considered when drafting any changes to the Property (Relationships) Act.

Conclusion

- 14. RWNZ would like the Law Commission to understand that women who live and work in our farming sector are often disadvantaged in the resolution of relationship property matters and that the current legislation is not working for all situations.
- 15. RWNZ are available to discuss this further to clarify our concerns and solutions, particularly sharing examples, and would like to take up any oral opportunity offered.

REMITS

The following remits were passed at the recent Leadership Council and Area Committee Workshop in Wellington on Wednesday 14 – Thursday, 15 February.

Remit 1: Breast Screening

That the remit: "Rural Women New Zealand encourage the Ministry of Health to raise the age of breast screening beyond the age of seventy years.", be amended to: "Rural Women New Zealand encourage the Ministry of Health to raise the age of free breast screening beyond the age of seventy years."

Remit 3: Preserving the Past

"Rural Women New Zealand preserves the past for the future."

Remit 4: Road Safety for Children

"That Rural Women New Zealand seeks an amendment to the rules regarding free school bus travel for students."

The following remit was not passed.

Remit 2: Vehicle Hire Firm Accountability

"Rural Women New Zealand encourage the Ministry of Transport to make motor vehicle hire firms accountable for accidents by their clients on New Zealand roads."

ENGAGING WITH LOCAL GOVERNMENT

There are many policies and issues that face rural families and communities where territorial authorities (Boards, Councils, District Councils & Regional Councils) have the power to make the changes the rural sector needs.

The next available avenue for community engagement is the long term planning process. Many territorial authorities (TAs) are discussing these at the moment and they will be releasing their Long Term Plans (LTP) for consultation shortly. With Councils being more constrained in their funding, if a project is not budgeted for in the LTP then it is not likely to happen. The LTP runs for at least ten years and reviewed every three. Get in contact with your local board member or councillor, keep an eye out for them on the website of your TA, or in the local paper (if you still have one), and take the time to read through the document carefully then consider making a submission on the projects presented or better still, submit a new one.

Rural Women New Zealand is particularly interested in safety around school buses and Board Member Sue Higgins is working with staff on how we can all engage with the LTP process. As information comes through, we will ensure it is communicated to members.

RURAL CRIME PREVENTION PARTNERSHIP

Rural Women New Zealand (RWNZ) have been identified by New Zealand Police as a stakeholder in the prevention of rural crime and as such were invited to be part of their Rural Stakeholders Crime Prevention Partnership (RSCPP) in 2016.

A meeting was held recently at Police HQ and Angela McLeod attended on behalf of RWNZ. The meeting elected a Chair (Community Patrol New Zealand) and discussed ways to work together, given that the partnership had been inactive for close to six months due to the election period. One of the outcomes of the meeting was based on the concern from members regarding rustling and the opportunity to submit on the Sentencing (Livestock Rustling) Bill. The outcome: RWNZ is co-ordinating a submission based on the organisation of RSCPP. This is a great example of collaboration and living up to the purpose of the partnership – **Uplifting Communities, Preventing Crime Together - Āwhina ngā hapori, hei whakaruruhau te iwi whānui.**


World's Best Chocolate Chip Cookies

Ingredients

220g butter ³/₄ cup white sugar 1 cup brown sugar 1 tablespoon vanilla extract 2 eggs, lightly beaten 3 cups all-purpose flour ³/₄ teaspoon baking soda ³/₄ teaspoon salt 3 cups chocolate chips





Method

Preheat oven to 180°C.

Cream butter and sugar. Add vanilla and eggs, mix well. In a separate bowl, sift flour, baking soda and salt together. Add dry ingredients to the creamed mixture and mix well. Add the chocolate chips.

Line cookie sheets with baking paper and place spoonfuls on to the sheets.

Bake 10-12 minutes. Remove from oven and cool on wire racks.

Nutty Brown Rice Salad

1/2 onion, finely diced

¹/₂ cup sultanas

Cook rice the day before (should take about 15-20 minutes).

Drain and add soy sauce, then leave overnight. The next day

add remaining ingredients and mix well. For the dressing, heat 1

tablespoon honey and 2 tablespoons oil. Mix in blender with a whole lemon and 3 tablespoons white vinegar. Pour over salad.

Cheese Scones

Ingredients

2 cups flour	1/2 teaspoon salt and celery salt
1 teaspoon icing sugar	1 tablespoon butter
Pinch of cayenne pepper	1cup grated cheese
2 teaspoons baking powder	1 cup milk
2 teaspoons cornflour	

Method

Preheat oven to 220°C.

Mix dry ingredients together, rub in butter and cheese, mix to soft dough with milk. Knead into squares about 2.5cm thick. Brush top with a little extra milk and cover with extra grated cheese.

Bake for 10 minutes.

SheEO is an initiative which has seen hundreds of women pitch their businesses with the hope of securing investment. Their model brings 500 women from each cohort (Activators) who each contribute \$1000NZD as an Act of Radical Generosity. The money is pooled together and loaned out at a low interest to five women-led Ventures selected by Activators. All Ventures are revenue generating with export potential and creating a better world through their business model or their product and/or service. Loans are paid back into the fund over five years and then loaned out again, which creates a perpetual fund that will be passed on through generations.

Ventures are provided with a guided development program and supported to accelerate their success in an environment of radical generosity, designed by women for women.

Activators are corporate executives, entrepreneurs, emerging women leaders, students, mothers, grandmothers, and daughters, ranging in age from 14-92. St Bathans Village Fete has been run by Cambrian St Bathans branch on the second Sunday in January for the last 14 years. It is timed to make the most of the huge holiday making population in the wider Central Otago area at that time. The branch has 8 - 10 members, so this is a major annual undertaking for this small group of ladies.

St Bathans is a tiny historic settlement in the remote heart of Central Otago, between Alexandra and Ranfurly. It is famous for its Goldmining history, the picture post card Vulcan Hotel, its ghosts and the Blue Lake, which was created by hydraulic sluicing in search of gold in the late 19th and early 20th century.

The Fete originated when the Cambrian St Bathans branch members wanted to create an event to bring people into the town and the area to celebrate its unique history, the amazing scenery, and provide opportunities for locals to raise funds and promote local cottage industries and businesses.

It began with 6 stalls on the Village Green in 2005, and has grown to host over 50 quality stallholders on the Village Green, along the main street and on any spare flat land available. It is estimated that the crowds attending have grown close to 1,000 people on the day. This number of people travelling to St Bathans has obvious benefits for all businesses in the wider area, as through traffic stops off for shopping, food and socialising opportunities along the way. There is always an Exhibition in the historic hall, which reflects either facets of local history, or local creative arts. Numerous community groups have benefited over the years by donations from the Exhibitions, donations following the event or by running stalls themselves.

This is a family friendly event, with the Cambrian St Bathans members running children's activities during the day. One of the iconic activities for the kids is a Ghost Hunt, where 'ghosts' are hidden around the village and the children are asked to complete a map, like a 'treasure map', by marking the ghosts' locations on it. Correct entries go into a draw for a prize. This encourages kids and parents alike to wander along the village main street, and soak up the history around them while looking for the 'ghosts'. Live Entertainment has been another feature in recent years, adding to the ambience of the event.

A St Bathans Village Fete Facebook page was set up around 3 years ago and now has over 500 followers.

Cambrian St Bathans members are proud of their efforts to promote and invigorate their community. Skills gained include event management, communication, compliance in health and safety and traffic management and much more. "We must be doing something right because the stallholders and the public keep coming back year after year" says Brenda Hore, Branch President.






